TARIFF PREFERENCES FOR LOES DEVILORED COUNTRIES

The Sovermment proposed to encode the peope of the Australian system of tarial preferences for selected manufactured and semi-Assaufactured products of less developed countries Mr J. Hollwen Acting Lytime Minister and Minister for Trade and Industry, concurred today.

Although it was too promite assess the long term benefits which lons developed computes might derive from the Australian preference system, there your already indications that it had stimulated interest in destrulin in the products to which preferences applied. The Assimulate Government has, however, not viewed its intiistive in the context of the limited Australian merket only. It had heped that its action might also serve as a lead to other countries.

It would be necessary for legislation to be introduced to give effect to the new proferences. Details of the commodities involved and other administrative particulars would be available when this legislation was introduced.
